

- Genesis I-II (Primeval History)
 - Critical issues
 - Frequent mythological echoes (Enuma Elish, ANET texts)
 - ~Composition: Documentary Hypothesis (monarchic vs. exilic setting)
 - Theological themes
 - Interpretive traditions: creatio ex nihilo, first person plural ("let us")
 - Ordering chaos ("passion for order")
 - ~Persistence of rebellion and grace


- Genesis 12–50 (Ancestral History)
 - Critical issues
 - History: no known historical events or persons and anachronisms
 - ~Composition: Documentary Hypothesis (monarchic vs. exilic setting)
 - Theological themes
 - ~Curiosities: Melchizedek, sacrifice of Isaac, Joseph's pagan wife
 - Theme of human evil inclination extended
 - ~New theme of unilateral promise (blessing creation through Abraham's family)
 - ~Complex vacillation between unilateral promise, bilateral covenant

- Critical Issues
 - Historicity of Exodus event
 - ~Weak proposals (Hyksos, Ahmose I, supply cities, 'apiru, Akhenaton monotheism)
 - ~No dateable Egyptian mention (Hebrew name, national plagues, Red Sea)
 - ~No archeological evidence (Hebrew occupation, Canaanite Levant)
 - Influence of Near Eastern myths
 - ~Moses's birth (Sargon of Akkad)
 - ~Watery chaos, divine warriors (Marduk vs. Tiamat)
 - ~Law Codes (Hammurabi, Eshnunna)

- Critical Issues
 - Priestly competition, conflict (Exod 32)
 - ~Aaronites vs. Levites
 - Throughout first and second temple periods
 - Composition
 - ~Yahwist: I-18 (slavery to Sanai), 19-24 (law code), 32-34 (golden calf)
 - ~Priestly: 25-31 (tabernacle instructions), 35-40 (tabernacle construction)
 - ~Dating: questioning early dating of Yahwist work

- Critical Issues
 - Priestly competition, conflict (Exod 32)
 - Redactions: call of Moses, magicians, some plagues, Passover, manna

- Covenant Code: abbreviated form suggests supplemental, not primary
- Deuteronomic style is purposeful rhetorical imitation to contradict theology (32:7-14)
- ~Yahwis/1-18 (slavery to Sanai), 19-24 llay pode), 32-34 Igolden calf)
- ~Priestly: 25-31 (tabernacle instructions), 35-40 (tabernacle construction)
- Dating: questioning early dating of Yahwist work

- *Theological Themes
 - Curiosities (slaying male Hebrews? divine hardening of Pharaoh? three forms of golden calf punishments?)
 - Genesis themes extended
 - ~Disobedience extended from humanity to Israel (people's rebellions, Aaron's dissimulations)
 - ~Passion for order extended from creation to people (Sabbath, Passover, Tabernacle)
 - ~Promise/Covenant tension extended (land, descendants vs. continual disobedience)
 - God and nations (correlating nations' blessing, cursing of Abraham's descendants)
